FROM THE CHAIRMAN . . .

On behalf of the Friends of Chartres, I wrote to Claire Crézé with our condolences following the horrific terrorist attacks in Paris and saying that the importance of twinning and friendship was today even greater, especially for the young. She replied that the French would not be beaten and that they would carry on with their lives as before.

This in fact was borne out the day after the events in Paris, by the successful launch of the Schools Art Exhibition for public viewing in the Maison du Saumon. The work has now been taken down and arrangements are being planned to collect the English entries and return them to their respective schools.

November 12th saw the launch of the new 2015/16 Schools Art Challenge held in the artOne foyer Gallery at the University of Chichester with over 40 people in attendance (see page 7). With thanks to Steve McDade and his staff, and also the encouraging number of local schools attending and interested in our new venture with the University, the year ahead looks promising.

Since the last edition of Cityink I have again enjoyed another illustrated presentation by Martyn Bell in the Mitre Theatre; the launch of the Harbour Rotary Club's Charity Cycle Ride to Chartres; the Championship Evening at Chichester Judo Club where I presented the Friends of Chartres' Award; another Cine Club film at the Picture Palace; and most recently the Festive Cheese and Wine Soirée in the Tudor Room of the Bishop's Palace, all of which are reported in this edition. My thanks and congratulations go to all of those involved in all these events.

Looking ahead to next year I hope to see as many of you as possible at our Annual Dinner in the Goodwood Restaurant at Chichester College on February 25th before they close down for refurbishment work.

Our AGM will be held on March 10th, accompanied by a interesting talk following the business part of the evening. An additional event for that month is a trip to the Wallace Collection on March 19th and on April 14th we have a French Quiz followed by our Exchange Visit to Chartres from 26th to 30th May. All of this represents a busy start to 2016 and I thank you all for your help and support during 2015.

Finally, on behalf of the Committee I wish you all a Happy Christmas and a Peaceful New Year.

'JEAN MOULIN & THE C.N.R. - THE LEGACY'

On 22 October in the Mitre Theatre at the University of Chichester, Martyn Bell, our past Chairman, gave us another of his fascinating talks about the French Resistance in WWII. This time it was about the *Conseil National de la Resistance* (CNR), the key role that Jean Moulin had played in setting it up, the role of RAF Tangmere in getting some of its key members in and out of France, and the influence the CNR had on post WWII politics in France.

After Jean Moulin left his post of Prefect in Chartres in October 1940 he returned to the family home near Avignon, in Vichy France. Jean Moulin was himself a talented artist and he set up an art gallery, which gave him cover for travelling around France. He made contact with De Gaulle in London and on De Gaulle's instructions set up an initial resistance coordinating committee (MUR) bringing together the three main resistance groups in Vichy France. A while later he became De Gaulle's sole representative for the whole of France tasked with setting up a single committee covering the whole of France.

The first meeting of this - the CNR - was held in secret at 48, Rue du Four, Paris on 27th May 1943 was organised and chaired, on the order of De Gaulle, by Jean Moulin. Representatives of all the main Resistance organisations, including the Communists, the pre-war political parties and the major Trade Unions, were represented. At the meeting a political agenda for a post-war French government was formulated.

At the 'launch' held in the Chichester Park Hotel on 3rd November, we learned that this year's ride had raised a total of £15,300 and an official cheque for £8,421 was presented to 'Mind Coastal West Sussex' as last year's main charity. The rest of the money would go to local charities.

Their main charity for Cycle Chartres 2016 is 'Pancreatic Cancer UK'. Let's hope they get a good number of cyclists taking part and are able to raise a substantial sum for these good causes.

After Jean Moulin's arrest a month later, Georges Giraud (a subsequent Prime Minister of France) took over his role of leader of the CNR. The successful establishment of the CNR by Jean Moulin played a significant part in De Gaulle being accepted by the Allies as France's sole leader, rather than Giraud or Marshall Petain.

After the liberation of Paris in August 1944, the CNR carried on meeting:

Much of the CNR's political agenda was implemented by the first post war French Government, of which many of the former resistance leaders were members. Examples of measures enacted were:

- the reform of the Public Service; creation of the ENA (June 1945)
- the first mandates on Social Security (October 1945)
- the nationalization of the Bank of France and the principal credit banks (December 1945)
- the nationalization of gas, electricity and major insurance companies (April 1946)
- laws imposed on factory committees; creation of Charbonnages de France (Coal Mines of France) and nationalization of all coal mines (May 1946)
- the creation of a law for family services (welfare) (August 1946)
- laws imposed on state pensions (September 1946)
- status of the Civil Service (October 1946)

In his memoirs, De Gaulle said that: "without the CNR there would not have been 'A resistance' but 'Several resistances" At the Liberation there would not have been a united people, but a divided country. We would not have stopped the Communists from holding parts of the Territory'.

Martyn's talk included much fascinating detail about the people that were members of the CNR and the places concerned. After taking questions from the audience, our Chairman, Ray Brown, thanked Martyn for his fascinating talk and presented him with a bottle of wine – French of course!



FRIENDS OF CHARTRES AWARD - Chichester Ronin Judo Club Championships

was the main criteria for the award, both to judo and to the club, Oscar had stood out from the excellent group of committed young Judoka at the club at the present time for the following reasons:

In addition to Friday's junior class Oscar joined the Monday sessions which could be more daunting as they are more technical, but Oscar - and the other juniors - all take it in their stride.

Commitment also means showing the ethos of Judo - respect and self discipline. Oscar always listens to instruction, works well with whoever his partner is and is keen to learn new techniques - clearly demonstrated when he is seen to be trying these techniques a few weeks later. He is keen to extend his judo into competition. Not only did he attend the Sussex Squad training session held earlier in

the year but, despite being the youngest and smallest there, showed his commitment by giving 100% and impressed all of the coaches! Judging by the number of times he has asked about subsequent sessions and how he can get into the squad, I know he is keen to have another crack at them!!!! Congratulations!

ART EXHIBITION DELIVERED TO CHARTRES -

Visits to Schools



When delivering the Schools Art Exhibition in past years we usually spend the Friday together with our French Friends hanging this in the foyer of the Mairie, but that building has now been demolished and a boarded off building site remains until the replacement structure is completed in 2016. Every cloud has a silver lining and we were able to establish that the work would first be hung in the two competing French schools before being transferred to the centre of town location, Maison du Saumon, for public viewing in November. These dates are later than in past years but will hopefully encourage greater participation from other French schools.

In place of our usual 'Exhibition Hanging' on the Friday, Claire Crézé organised visits to two schools. Accompanied by our Mayor, Patrick Geroudet, Philippe Rabartin and Jean-Claude Grouteau we visited Grand Jardin in the morning where we met the Directrice Mme Bonnin and teacher of English M. Desdourge.

Having entered the Art Competition over several years we feel they are indeed old friends and it was really good to be invited there again.

We joined in their English lesson and our Mayor answered the pupils' questions. M. Desdourge then showed a previous competition entry which had been too

large to hang in the Studio at Pallant House Gallery but, thanks to the Dean and Chapter, had taken pride of place in the North Transept of Chichester Cathedral. They are now looking forward to receiving details of the new Art 'Challenge' and are really keen to take part.

We were also able to deliver letters written by pupils from two classes at Parklands School as requested by Emma Raynsford. She hopes to establish a 'communications link' between these two schools and is looking forward to receiving their replies.





After lunch our second visit was to Jean Moulin College which is near the Cathedral and bears the name of this former Prefect of Chartres, whose bronzed sillouette plaque takes central place in the courtyard. The Headteacher had asked if they could form a link with a school in Chichester and at our meeting with them we were able to offer an 'Art Link' with the Head of Art at the Girls High School.

We were then introduced to three pupils who took us on a tour of the college. Their English was

extremely good and very fluent. When we reached the music department the Mayor asked if the pupils would serenade us, which caused some laughter. Then to our surprise the quietest of our three guides offered to do just that. Her impromptu rendition of 'Nymphs &

Shepherds' was delightful and certainly a joy to hear such a beautiful voice. A true delight. Finally, on reaching the language department we were able to take part in their English lesson. Then it was a rush to the Hôtel Montescot (old Mairie) where Patrick hosted our Civic Reception with the Chichester Lions.



Although we were not able to visit l'école du Rechèvres (this year's 'Winners' of the French Trophy) we have received photos of the Exhibition displayed in their school (see photos below). Claire & Philippe join the Directrice, Mme Vallerie and English teacher with their winning entry.

West Dean's entry also takes pride of place (this year's English winner) and whilst this school already has a well-established linking with a French school in Normandy the Headteacher, Gill Moss, is happy to form an 'Art Link' with Rechèvres.

Thank you to everyone who helped to make these visits possible and so enjoyable.

Working with the University of Chichester - Fine Art Department & Otter Gallery

'A Tale of Twinned Cities':

Chapter 6: 'Paper Cut-Outs (Gouaches/Découpé)'












Steve McDade, Head of Fine Art Sheriff of West Sussex and thanked our grant providers and sponsors for their continued support plus our new sponsors, Accountants Moore Stephens.. He briefly explained the reasons for our newly named 'Challenge' and explained that our ties with Pallant House continued

as Marc Steene had agreed to be on this year's judging panel. Introducing the Head of Department, Steve McDade, Ray informed everyone that our new partnership with the University's Fine Art Department and the Otter Gallery had been greeted with enthusiasm and support from all and particularly from Steve who, together with former Headteacher, Lin Chaplin, had worked on the subject and theme for this year's Challenge.

Steve's presentation began with an explanation of the title 'Paper Cut-outs' and how the work of Henri Matisse could be used as a starting point for the theme of 'A Tale of Twinned Cities'. Showing slides of Matisse's work he encouraged the school teachers to tackle the theme in as broad and open way as possible, with suggested starting points which included the great cathedrals in both cities. Examples of innovative and original ways of using colour and cut shapes were on display within the studio and included both 2D and 3D assemblages, which had been created by the University students with guidance from their Tutors. Both students and staff had also created the magnificent and magical display of these works which had greeted us on entering the large foyer/exhibition area entrance of the artOne building. Two of the Tutors were able to demonstrate and discuss further the subject matter, media and various techniques as required.



Although, within reason, there wasn't a size limit to the schools' work, teachers were reminded that mobiles should be able to be dismantled to enable their transport to France. Of the fifteen schools that had indicated their intention to take part, eleven attended the Launch with four others being unable to due to other commitments.



Rob Campling was busy taking many photos of the evening's events and displays and these, together with a copy of Steve's presentation, will be sent to France. It is hoped that on receiving these, they will be as 'enthused' as those attending were, and that they will be encouraged to take part in the Challenge and to celebrate the work of one of their countrymen.

'LES CHORISTES'

(shown in October 2015)

After the challenge of 'Jules et Jim' and the French 'nouvelle vague', 'Les Choristes' shown at the Cine Club in October, was a delight. It tells the story of Clément Mathieu, an out-of-work musician and aspiring composer, who takes a job as a teacher in a reform school for difficult boys. The film opens with a glimpse of a successful conductor, who is returning to France for his mother's



funeral. He is approached by a former school mate, Pépinot, who presents him with a diary written in 1948 by Mathieu. The rest of the film is a flashback to Mathieu's time at the school. What is the connection with the conductor? We have to wait till the end of the film to find out.

The diary recounts Mathieu's time at the reform school, where, repelled by the harsh treatment of the boys by most of the staff, he tries treating them kindly. He forms a choir and succeeds in transforming the boys' lives by acquainting them with the magic and power of music. He discovers that one boy, Pierre Morhange, has a golden voice, and plans to help him win a scholarship to the Conservatoire at Lyon. These plans come to nothing when Mathieu is suddenly sacked from the school after taking the boys on an unscheduled outing to the forest during the headmaster's absence. This part of the film ends with Mathieu's departure followed by the small boy, Pépinot, whom he takes under his wing.

At the end of the film, the mystery is solved. The conductor is none other than Pierre Morhange, whose mother, inspired by Mathieu's work with her son, helped him to enter the Conservatoire.

The harsh realism of the conditions at the school prevent this film from becoming over-sentimental, and the music sung by the boys' choir provides a glorious background to the narrative. No wonder that a new film ("The Chorus") based on this story was made in 2014, with Dustin Hoffman as the choirmaster.
