On our return from a flight delayed visit to see our family in Montreal a meeting was held with Steve McDade, Head of Fine Arts at the University of Chichester to discuss the 2016-17 Friends of Chartres Schools Art Challenge. The start of a new University year is always extremely busy for Steve and I would like to thank him for finding time for our meeting and enthusiastically supporting our project.

Thanks to a great deal of pre-meeting research work carried out by Lin Chaplin we were able to agree an art theme and title which I am excited about and which I am sure will be of interest and well supported by the schools in both Chichester and Chartres.

The Launch will be held at the University on the 3rd November at which it is hoped to set the foundations for links between the schools and University students. This is

something that we had hoped to achieve in our first year of working with the University, but were unable to do so. I see this as being very important for the future of our twinning in that it brings together our association and community links with young people and their parents.

For a number of reasons we were unable to transport the 2015-16 schools' artwork across to Chartres in mid-September as planned, however, this has now been arranged to take place between 6th and 9th October. Patrick Geroudet will once again host Margaret and myself and we look forward to visiting local schools to promote the challenge and our twinning.

Sub-committee meetings are currently being held to look at future events and publicity and I would like to thank those involved in these tasks.

I look forward to meeting many of you at a 'full-house' for David Nason's illustrated talk on "19th Century Opera in Paris" on the 11th October at the University's Mitre Theatre and please make sure to book early for our limited number Social Evening in the Council Chamber on the 28th November.

ABBAYE ROYALE DE DREUX


The place is somewhat bizarre. It is a city for the dead, its citizens being members of the Bourbon-Orleans family, the last royal family of France. At the time of the French revolution, the graves of those family members buried nearby had been desecrated and the bodies heaped in a communal grave. It was on the site of this that the present building was raised after the Battle of Waterloo and the restoration of the monarchy. Family members were subsequently gathered in death in this very imposing building.

Because of the political turmoil of the times at the end of the nineteenth century, many had ended their days in exile in England and, being Roman Catholic, they had been buried in the St Charles Borromeo Chapel in Weybridge, Surrey, now the World Mission Korean Presbyterian Church. Church buildings, like other properties, change hands. Those buried



there were exhumed and transported to Dreux for reburial. In all, there are over seventy family members buried in the chapel, though in some cases it is just their hearts, nearly all with a statue.

Built originally in the classical style, it was later enlarged and altered into the neo-Gothic style that we see today. It is built to a high specification, with the best



sculptors and artists of the day. The Howard family chapel at Arundel is small beer b y comparison to this building.











There are notable stained glass windows made at the Sevres works with a particularly notable blue, the 'recipe' for which has been lost. Particularly interesting are the tombs of Ferdinand-Philippe d'Orleans and his wife Helen of Mecklenburg-Schwerin.

Since she was a Protestant she was not entitled to be buried within the building itself. However, this was circumvented by her monument being technically outside the building but beside her husband. A hole in the wall was constructed whereby they could be close in death as in life, their statues lying side by side. It is a

very interesting collection of funereal sculpture, the like of which we do not have in this country.

As well as being commemorative, such sculpture is in part propaganda, conveying a message



of what values should be respected. There is thus the 'virtuous wife' with Louis-Philippe and his wife Marie-Amelie kneeling in prayer beside him. It's a long way from Tracey Emin's bed.

Anthony was to stay with Marc and Marie France, so I saw him first. He had lived in Montreal for a few years and now had a French-Canadian partner, Severine, who was not coming. He spoke pretty good English (as does his mother) but I did try and use my not so good French. He was about to change jobs and move I think to Montpelier.

We all set off for Roxanne's house early evening. It was a perfect warm and sunny evening and the party started in the garden where I met Roxanne's family and Audrey with

Tess, who needless to say was the centre of attention. Gaspard was very good at playing with his little cousin and the garden gave them plenty of space to run around in. Marie Andre, her partner Thimotey and Ginette turned up somewhat later and then the party got going in earnest with champagne and delicious canapés. Most of the conversation was naturally in French, some of which I could follow but much I missed. Some of the family had not seen each other for a long time so there was much to catch up on.

One unexpected pleasure for me was that Hypolite spoke very good English and was keen to practise, so I spent much of the evening talking to him. We talked about the UK EU referendum, politics in general, motor sport and







tennis, as well as many other things. To my surprise I found I had much in common with him. although we were two generations apart as well as from different countries. This was especially the case when it came to politics - I had much more in common with Hypolite than I do with most people I know in Chichester! He has not yet visited the UK and hopes to do so soon. I said he would be more than welcome to stay with us in Chichester.

As it started to get dark, we moved inside to continue the party with more food and drink, including a birthday

cake. A group photo was taken (with some difficulty) on the stairs, after which some people started to leave, including us. had been a most enjoyable evening and a great privilege to be able to be part of their celebrations of my hostess' birthday.

CHILDREN'S EXCHANGE TO CHARTRES - 1961

Dear Margaret,

I think that is has probably only taken two years but at last I am enclosing a copy of the photograph which appeared in the Chartres Echo Republican at Easter time in 1961 showing us arriving in Chartres. I am the bright eyed young man in the front row on the right!

We had endured what is still the worst channel crossing I can remember. We travelled by coach to Newhaven, as I recall, then boarded the SNCF ferry to Dieppe. The British and French railways shared the channel routes at that time. We took the train to Paris and then went on by coach to Chartres, so were pretty exhausted when we arrived.

They took us to the [then] brand new Hôtel de Ville (which has now been knocked down to make way for some huge new building) and we were met by our hosts. I only had to walk round the corner as the Gautier family with whom I was staying had an official house as part of the new municipal complex.

I hope that the twinning will survive the strains of Brexit. It is never easy trying to arrange cross-channel events but at least communication should be easier now with e-mail and instant phone contact rather than having to wait 40 minutes for a line to England which was what happened in 1961.
