The Association's 56th Annual General Meeting held at St George's Centenary Centre on Thursday 9th March 2017 was attended by the Mayor, Cllr Peter Budge and, as President the Mayor opened the meeting by welcoming the 28 members who were in attendance. Following his introduction and, having signed the Minutes of the last AGM, he then handed over to the Chairman for his report.

It had been explained that, having served as Chairman for three consecutive years, Ray would be retiring from this role, as per our constitution which now allows him to continue to serve as the Immediate Past Chairman. Ray then gave a very full report of all the activities which had taken place during the past year. We had also worked with the Friends of Ravenna and the Friends of Valletta to provide a 'Three Cities' event during the Festival of Chichester. He thanked all the committee members for their support over the last three years and explained how we have continued to encompass the community within our activities during this time.

The transition from our working with Pallant House Gallery to now working with the Fine Art Department at the University for our Schools Art Challenge had been very successful. The new, larger venue for the Awards Ceremony had enabled more school children and their families to attend this. Similarly the Private View, held in the larger Foyer Gallery in the Fine Arts Department had enabled attendees to vote for the new "People's Choice Award" and it was also hoped more University students would be involved with the project. He thanked Marc Steene (PHG) and Steve McDade (Uni) for their continued support for this project, now in its 8th year and finally thanked the local firms and Associations for their continued sponsorship and help.



These new facilities are the result of a total refurbishment of the Catering Department and replace the now out-dated 'Goodwood Restaurant' and the original kitchens. However, the new name is a reflection of when the College was first built - ie 1964.

Held in the bar section of the restaurant, we were greeted with a Sherry Reception, enabling guests and members to be re-acquainted. We were also able to order our wine selections before being directed to the new restaurant area. Here the students had set the tables and the name places as shown on the seating plan, ensuring the correct cutlery was in place for each person's choice of dishes.

VISIT TO MARTINIQUE

Fort de France, the capital of Martinique, came as something of a surprise. After disembarking from the fast catamaran which had brought us from the neighbouring St Lucia, as EU passport holders we were whisked through immigration, whilst St Lucians were subjected to thorough checks. Martinique is, after all, a department of metropolitan France. This was clear from the smart taxi which took us to our hotel along smooth city streets - quite a surprise after our stay in laid-back St Lucia.

Martinique and its sister island, Guadeloupe, are both DOM (Départements Outre-Mer). The legal, administrative and education systems are the same as in any mainland French department, and while the UK is still part of the EU, their citizens have the right to work here. Not that many would make that choice. The people to whom we spoke declared themselves proud to be French.

Walking round Fort de France, we found several public buildings which would have looked at home in any French city. The sumptuous public library bore a frieze with the



names of France's greatest writers: Hugo, Lamartine, Boileau, Balzac. There is even a short promenade resembling the famous Promenade des Anglais in Nice. There are fine examples of colonial architecture all over the city. The

covered market, however, was a blaze of colour only found in the Caribbean - stalls with exotic fruits, flowers and vegetables literally tumbling over one another.

Our visit coincided with the French half-term break in February; thousands of French citizens had sensibly left the French winter behind and escaped to the sun. As we drove to the south of the island we were caught in tailbacks as bad as any we see on or own

A27. This gave us plenty of time to observe the scenery, which on the outskirts of Fort de France consisted entirely of 'grandes surfaces' like Carrefour, M.Bricolage and E.LeClerc.



We decided therefore to shun the beaches in favour of mountainous inland routes. We drove north to St Pierre, the original capital of Martinique, which was destroyed by a volcanic eruption in 1902. The only survivor of the disaster was the prisoner, Auguste Cyparis, who was saved

by the thick walls of his prison cell. For him, crime definitely did pay!

Like St Lucia and the other Windward Islands, Martinique is stunningly beautiful with its combination of rocky coastline,



sandy beaches, mountains and lush rainforest scenery. The

highlight for us was our visit to the extraordinary Garden de Balata. Set high in the mountains, the designer, Jean-Philippe Thoze, has used a steep ravine to create a series of mini-gardens which include over 300 varieties of palm trees and more than 3,000 tropical plants from around the world.

Martinique is strikingly different from the former British Islands, which are countries in their own right, each with its own government and independent economy.

Farming in Martinique is large-scale with two main crops, bananas and sugar, which are exported to France in exchange for French goods. The supermarkets contain groceries imported from France, with just one counter for local produce. It is only in the markets that you see local fruit and vegetables. France and the UK may be neighbours, but they usually manage to come up with different solutions. Vive la différence!

And, by the way, everyone in Martinique speaks perfect French!

The popular choice among the reds was the Vaqueyras offered by Paul Everrett, which was described as 'mellow, full-bodied with oodles of flavour'.

This was a convivial gathering which brightened up a cold January evening, and deserves to be repeated in the future for those who were unable to attend this time.
