FROM THE CHAIRMAN . . .

I can hardly believe it is a year since I was elected Chairman of the Friends of Chartres. A lot has happened during that time, including a visit from our friends in Chartres last April and many other enjoyable events. In response to the views expressed by members at the 2017 AGM, a busy programme of events and social occasions has been organised for 2018. We do urge you to give these events your support.

Our exchange visit leaves on April 26, and this year 39 of us will travel to Chartres. We have several new participants on both sides of the Channel, which is most encouraging. Back at home, members of the Association have been keen to keep up their French, with 26 people attending a monthly conversation circle. It is always important for twinning associations to find 'new blood', and we have been pleased to welcome a number of new members to the Association this year.

Highlights of the year so far have been a wide-ranging and well-researched talk on Morocco given by Margaret Devitt, who has a long association with the Friends of Chartres, and our excellent Annual Dinner at Chichester College. We look forward to a lecture recital in March on French music, the Schools Art Challenge in June and a Bastille Day celebration in July. This year's Three Cities event will give us the opportunity to hear the well-known sculptor, Philip Jackson, in conversation with John Coldstream - an exciting contribution to the Festival of Chichester. Full details of these future events are given in this edition of Citylink.

I would like to draw your attention to a very special excursion we are organising for the Friends of Chartres on May 19. This replaces our proposed visit to Lewes and will



include a visit to Dennis Severs House in Spitalfields, London - a recreation of an 18th century Huguenot weavers' house. For those who have the stamina, there will be an opportunity to go on to the Monet and Architecture Exhibition at the National Gallery.

A lot of work has been done on our new website, which should go 'live' very soon, and will make it easier for members to access information about our activities, as well as attracting new members to the association.

And as a postscript, I would like to express appreciation for the new French president Emmanuel Macron who during his recent brief visit to our country stunned us with his clarity of thought and excellent command of English. During his visit, Theresa May highlighted the importance of twinning for promoting international understanding and praised the work done at grassroots level by the many twinning associations. Music to the ears!

I wish you a happy Easter and look forward to seeing you at our events during the year.

'LYAUTEY TO SAINT LAURENT:

'The Impact of the French Protectorate on Morocco'

An Illustrated Talk by Margaret Devitt - (Monday February 5)

Morocco is a land of mystery and exoticism, which attracts visitors from around the world. Many countries, including England, have tried to forge links with Morocco, but only the French succeeded in forming close ties with this country. For them, these ties were a matter of national pride and colonial ambition. It was on this aspect that Margaret focused in her wide-ranging talk.

The talk was accompanied by


fabulous photographs of Morocco, both past and present, which brought this fabulcus country to life. These included scenes from everyday life, such as the preparation of the national beverage, mint tea, and Moroccan arts and crafts carpets, tiles and leather work. We had a birds-eye view of some of the natural features of the country from the soaring Atlas mountains to the desert regions of the south - not forgetting Marrakech's extraordinary market place, Jemma- el-Fnaa with its snake charmers, Berber dancers and colourful food stalls.



economic traditions of Morocco, while seeking to bring the benefits of European civilisation to the country such as medicine, education and public works.

Many famous 'names' are associated with Morocco. Winston Churchill travelled there in the winter to paint, staying at the famous La Mamounia

in Marrakech. For Yves St Laurent, Morocco became a home from home; his designs were influenced by Berber traditional jewellery and crafts. With his partner. Pierre Bergé he bought and restored the gardens created by painter Jacques Majorelle, famous for his



evidenced by its many fine palaces displaying exquisite tile and stucco work. It was not until 1912 that Morocco became a French Protectorate, regaining its independence 44 years later in 1956. Maréchal Lyautey, a firm believer in the civilising effect of colonisation, was appointed as Morocco's first resident general and high commissioner. He was a fortunate choice as he showed respect for the political, social and



use of cobalt blue paint. These gardens are now one of the most visited places in Morocco. A museum dedicated to Yves St Laurent was opened in Marrakech last year.

Margaret shared a wealth of information about Morocco with us and her deep love of the country was evident. There was talk of a Friends of Chartres visit - certainly an idea worth pursuing.

FRIENDS OF CHARTRES AGM - 14th March 2018



As our President, The Mayor of Chichester, Cllr Peter Following discussions it was agreed that: Evans, Chaired the meeting held at Saint George's Centre after welcoming the 32 members and guests attending. The Minutes of the last AGM had been sent to all members and, as there were no Matters Arising, it was agreed that he sign these as a true record. He then handed over to the Chairman for her report.

Julia Sander explained that 2 main points emerged from last year's questionnaire and the discussions which took place after the AGM (a) a wider range of events and (b)

aim to expand our membership to include families and young people, hence a busy programme schedule for 2018 had been planned and we are seeking to set up a Junior Twinning Club. She then went through, in some detail, last year's events including Social (Boules & Croquet, Do-it-yourself Dinner, Wine & Cheese Soirée, Annual Dinner and a Coffee Morning) and Cultural (Visits, Illustrated talks and Cine Club) plus 'sell-out' Festival of Chichester Event with Patricia Routledge 'In Conversation' (working with our sister associations).

We had hosted the Exchange enjoyed by 36 participating Chartrains with a busy programme and we have 3 new family exchanges going to Chartres this year. The Schools Art Challenge Private View & Awards Ceremony were again held at the University and the Art Exhibition was later transported for public display in Chartres. Our conversation circles had expanded with new members joining the Association and, with a grant from the City Council, a new website to replace the current one was being developed to attract new members. We are also working on preparing a programme for 2019 to celebrate the two Cities' 60 years of Twinning. Julia ended by thanking her fellow officers and committee for their support throughout the year and with their support is sure we will continue to thrive.

John Wilton then presented his Treasurer's Report referring to the accounts which had been approved by the Examiner of Accounts and previously sent to all members. These included the following two proposals:

RESISTANCE BY MOONLIGHT - Moulin to Melay: 19th March 2018

Commemorating the 75th Anniversary on 19th March 2018

The University of Chichester in partnership with Tangmere Aviation Museum & The Secret WW2 Learning Network

The University of Chichester in partnership with Tangmere Aviation Museum & The Secret WW2 Learning Network had prepared the following programme of lectures and film. Starting at 4.00pm through to 7.00pm it had attracted a fully packed audience in Room 1.01 (first floor) at the Chichester Campus, College Lane.

After a welcome by Professor Hugo Frey and introduction by Dr Andrew Smith (both University Lecturers), Dudley Hooley (Tangmere Military Aviation Museum) described details of the RAF Special Duties flights including one singularly important flight in the history of France and Britain. This took pace on the night of March 19th 1943, only a month before the first meeting of the council that would knit together the strands of resistance in France. A clandestine night flight from Britain, Codename SIRÉNE II, delivered the personnel who would realise that promise.

As one of scores of daring moonlight operations from RAF Tangmere, this flight by F/Lt John Bridger, 161 Squadron Lysander, enabled Jean Moulin, Christian Pineau and General Delestraint to return to central France.

RAF Tangmere was the forward operating base for RAF Tempsford's 'Special Duties' Lysander aircraft, and from 1944 a building on what is now the University's campus had served as the Operations Room for RAF Tangmere.

Martyn Bell (*The Secret WW2 Learning Network*) talked about Jean Moulin, his importance to the Resistance and his links to Chartres, then Dr Andrew W.M. Smith (*University of Chichester, Society for the Study of French History*) spoke about the CNR, and described its Legacy. This was followed by a screening of interviews recorded by Martyn Cox (*The Secret WW2 Learning Network*) of pilots and veterans.



This Free Event recognised the continuing importance of Franco-British bonds and the wartime bravery of all those who helped liberate France from Nazi Occupation. It was held in Room 1.01(first floor) at the University, College Lane, on the 75th Anniversary of Jean Moulin's departure from RAF Tangmere.

WHAT MAKES FRENCH MUSIC FRENCH?

She spoke of the wide range of French music from folk troubadours to the opera and the café accordion culture of Montmartre. From the French impressionist painters who

explored new avenues of colour, she linked the exploration of sound and French impressionists' paintings and suggested they painted 'with the colour of sound'.

Her enthusiasm was certainly reflected by the 20 vocal students who sang for us. We were rewarded by a wonderful range of French songs and not only did they sing for us but, as Paul





Devonshire said in his thank you address, we were also treated to fully professional classical attire, evening dresses and dinner suits.

A very enjoyable evening and certainly for me an educational one as, though I am a Chichester Graduate, I had no idea of this fantastic Degree Course. Congratulations to all of them and certainly, I am sure, all who were lucky enough to attend the performance would join me in wishing everyone of them much success in the future.
