## FROM THE CHAIRMAN . . .

Our 60th anniversary got off to a fine start with a visit from the Maire de Chartres, M Jean-Pierre Gorges, accompanied by his wife, Stella and 10 Chartres City Councillors. It was a great honour to host M Gorges, who is a very busy man, and only able to visit one of Chartres' twin cities on rare occasions.

Our Mayor, Martyn Bell arranged an interesting programme during which M Gorges spent the morning with Louise Goldsmith, Leader of West Sussex County Council and visited the WSCC solar farm at Westhampnett. Later in the day, M Gorges also met the High Sheriff of the county, Caroline Nicholls and the Duke of Richmond, thus forging useful links at civic level between our two cities. The focal point of the visit, the re-signing of the Deed of Jumelage, took place in the historic surroundings of the Council Chamber.

Alongside the civic programme, a number of other activities were arranged, which are reported in this edition of Citylink. Here there were a few surprises. M Gorges proved an entertaining speaker though his rapid delivery made translation challenging. He is also adept at handling a spade, and showed off his skills planting a commemorative tree in Litten Gardens.

Now we look forward to hosting our visitors from Chartres over the Easter period. We are expecting around 50 people this year a record number. The Orchestre d'Harmonie de Chartres, the equivalent of our own City Band, will also visit Chichester at Easter and will play a concert for us in the University Chapel on Easter Saturday. We are arranging a busy programme of events, details of which are included in this edition.

As it is our 60th anniversary year, we have arranged some special events for our guests, one of which is dinner in the superb private rooms at West Dean House. Another is a performance of a play written specially for the Friends of Chartres by local playwright, Greg Mosse. Putting on events of this nature is costly, but the Association has been saving money in order to subsidise hosts and help with the cost of entertaining their guests. These events will also be open to members who are not hosting.

You will see from the programme on page 3 that two more special weekends are planned this year: the Schools Art Challenge Exhibition and concert of Anglo French music in June and a mini-exchange to Chartres in September.

We look forward, therefore to a busy and productive year. on the national level, we are living through uncertain times. We can be sure, however, that whatever happens between our two countries over the next months, the torch of friendship between our twin cities of Chichester and Chartres burns as brightly as ever sixty years after it was lit in 1959. We hope that the next sixty years will prove just as fruitful.

After welcoming the 23 members attending he thanked the Chairman and committee for their input into the recent 60th Anniversary events for the Mayor of Chartres' visit.. As there were no matters arising, it was agreed he sign the Minutes of the last meeting as a true record.

# CHICHESTER CITY BAND - photos by Wendy Devonshire & John Wilton





We started with our respective national anthems and then came the programme proper. This was in two halves with an interval for drinks and nibbles. In true franglais manner, these are called "brass bands". There is indeed a Championnat de France de Brass Band, and Youtube reveals a high standard of performance and great enthusiasm for the genre.

My favourite piece of the evening was Lightwalk by

Barrie Gott, a swing big band number written by a Salvationist Army man. If not restrained by English reserve and my mother's enduring injunction not to show off, I would have happily jived on the Assembly Hall's dance floor. We are lucky in Chichester to have a band of such good quality and they rightly displayed their trophies to prove the point.









# ORCHÈSTRE D'HARMONIE DE CHARTRES

Orchèstre d'harmonie de Chartres (OHC) will be staying in Chichester over the Easter period and to

mark the 60th anniversary of our twinning, will play a concert for the Friends of Chartres in the `University Chapel.

Formed in 1956, the OHC comprises 60 musicians and is an integral part of the cultural life of the city. As well as performing at official functions, the band plays in the cathedral and churches of Chartres as well as at events around the city.

The band includes three sections: woodwind, brass and percussion. It plays a wide range of music of both well-known and less familiar pieces.

The musical director, René Castelain began his musical career as a trumpeter, winning first prize at the Paris conservatory. After training at a music academy in

Paris, he travelled internationally as band leader. He has been the musical director of OHC since 1997.

The aim of OHC is to promote and develop the playing of instrumental music among adults and young people. Its members are volunteers who are true music lovers. The OHC is always keen to welcome new members.

# RE-SIGNING THE JUMELAGE DEED on 1st March 2019 & ANNUAL DINNER - CELEBRATING 60 YEARS OF TWINNING



The historic Council Chamber was indeed a most significant venue for the re-signing of the Deed of Jumelage as it was here that the original Deed was signed by Alderman Charlie Newell, Monsieur Pichard, and the Town Clerk, Eric Banks on 28th February 1959.

Some sixty years later the two current Mayors, Cllr Martyn Bell and Monsieur Jean-Pierre Gorges, together with the Chairmen of their respective city's Twinning Associations, Julia Sander and Claire Crézé, re-signed the Deed of Twinning.

As can be seen in the photo above, also present was the High Sheriff of West Sussex, Mrs Caroline Nicholls, DL wearing full ceremonial regalia and (far left) Yvonne Chrétien, Chairman of Chichester Commission of the French Twinning Association 'Des Amis des Jumelages de Chartres'.

The Council Chamber was packed to capacity with both French and English well-wishers including Chartres Adjoints and Councillors who had accompanied their Mayor for this very special occasion plus Barry Newell, the son of Alderman Charlie Newell.

Former Mayors of Chichester had been asked to wear their Past Mayors badges and many photos were taken to record this special occasion by our 'offical' photographer, Rob Campling, who also took one showing Former Chairmen of the Friends of Chartres Association who had managed to be there.

Prior to this re-signing there had been a special Cathedral Evensong which included an Act of Thanksgiving for 60 years of friendship between our two cities (full report on page 8) and following would be our 'very special' Friends of Chartres Annual Dinner - being held in the adjoining Assembly Room.

We had earlier been greeted with a 'Welcoming' glass of Champagne so the atmosphere was already very convivial. Wine was also available to purchase as Julia had organised Jan to be in charge of this whilst Anne-Louise Briggs had negotiated with Vanilla Caterers who

prepared the delicious 3-course meal (with vegetarian options) for the 73 attendees - and the table decorations had a red, white and blue theme echoing our two national flags.



Each guest received a souvenir booklet prepared by Anne Scicluna and Julia Sander but sadly their new badges had been delayed and therefore would need to be be distributed at a later time. However, this technical 'hitch' did not dampen the happy atmosphere and we looked forward to hearing the official speeches.



Fortunately, with Julia's excellent translation skills, all were able to understand both Mayors' speeches, the main themes of which were looking forward with renewed enthusiasm to continuing our long-established friendship and 'with tongue in cheek' perhaps create a faster journey-time between our two beautiful cities. The final words then came from our Chairman and were 'echoed' by all.

# 'Eurotunnel Winners'



Sunday 8 May will be a day to remember for many Cicestrians. In particular the 6 & 7 year old children of the Lancastrian Infant School who, together with their Headteacher, Lin Chaplin, members of the governing body, Anne-Louise Briggs, (Chairman), Margaret Brown (Clerk) and parents, travelled to Folkestone. There, they saw Ray Brown (Vice- Chairman of the governors) receive a trophy for the school from Sir Alistair Morton, Co-Chairman of Eurotunnel. As Project Co-ordinator, Ray was also given a cheque for 4,000 ECUs (approx £3,000) to enable his project team to put this winning project into action.

The Award Ceremony was the last event in a week of celebrations set around the Inauguration of the Channel Tunnel by President Mitterand and The Queen. Co-ordinated by the Local Government International Bureau, this international town-twining competition had attracted over 500 enquiries and eventually received almost 100 entries, from which 20 were short-listed and just 6 chosen as winners.

After putting our ideas together and completing the entry form we needed confirmation that the school in France would participate. They were on holiday! . . . and so was Jeannie Chassanne!! However, determination pays and after leaving messages on answer machines in Chartres; the use of Swiftair postal services; and fax facilities; the necessary signature was received and we were in by the skin of our teeth.

The project - to produce a board game following the journey from Chichester to Chartres via London and Paris and using the Tunnel - is primarily a twinning aid. It will be aimed at 4-7 year-olds to enable them to learn about each other's community, country and language.

At the recent Celebration Dinner Anne-Louise drew our attention to an error of information inside the 'souvenir booklet' which was given to all attendees and It was suggested this could be rectified by putting the original report into the next Citylink - so here it is.

As you will see it was Lancastrian Infants School (and NOT Central School) that brought this accolade to Chichester - now 25 years ago (how time just flies by!)

I wonder where these children are now?

For us 4 (Lin, Anne-Louise, Ray and myself) this was the first of our many 'projects' working with local schools and linking these with similar schools in both Chartres & Ravenna, all within the realms of our city's Twinning. (MB)

However, the project team has high hopes and suffice it to say that copyright and patents are being sought!

For the Director of l'école Maternelle this was his first visit to England where we met Didier Deschamps for the first time. He was introduced to the Mayor of Chichester, President of our Association (at that time Cllr Anne Scicluna) and Chairman, Diana Taylor, who had both travelled with the children to attend the ceremony. Taking a trophy back to Chartres must be a wonderful souvenir of an exciting and historic weekend for him.

Our best memories, however, came from the participation by the children who were invited on stage by Sir Alistair, as the photograph shows. They were also given bags of "goodies" from Eurotunnel, followed by a buffet lunch and a good look round the Exhibition Centre - surely all this was worth their leaving Chichester at 7.30am that morning.

After the Blessing, delivered by the Bishop of Chichester, there was time for a moment of reflection in the glorious surroundings of the cathedral as Charles Stanford's Verdun was played on the organ.
