If you choose this option, you would stay in a hotel at your own expense, but would participate fully in the activities arranged for us.

It's our turn to travel to Chartres in 2020. If you wish to take part, please complete and return the application form included with this edition of Citylink.

We are sure that those of you who have been involved before will be looking forward to visiting your friends again. If you have not twinned before, do consider taking part - it is an excellent way of finding out more about life in France and making new and often life-long friends. If you are a first-timer, please bear in mind that the exchange is a reciprocal arrangement. Anyone who stays with a host in Chartres, therefore, must be prepared to host when the group from Chartres comes to Chichester in 2021.

We will be travelling by coach via Brittany Ferries from Portsmouth to Caen. Unfortunately, there has been a sharp increase in the cost of the ferry, so the journey will cost rather more than on previous occasions. Depending on numbers, this is likely to be between £130 - £150 per head. The more who travel, the cheaper it will work out. We will continue to offer a reduced rate for children under the age of 18.

After discussions with our friends in Chartres, we are able this year to offer a few places to people who are unable to offer return hospitality. You would travel with the coach and take part in the programme organised for us in Chartres but would stay in a hotel. You would be responsible for booking your own hotel accommodation, but we can advise you on good options.

26 YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP AND A NIGHT TIME TRIP ON 'LE PETITE TRAIN DE CHARTRES'

Having not been to Chartres since 2016 and not seen our 'twins' Marc and Marie-France Deleloy for over two years, when the chance to participate in the 'Mini-Exchange' (from 12-15 September) came up I was keen to go.



When I asked Marc and Marie-France if it would be possible to stay with them, they said they would be very pleased to see me, but they were going away for a week on the Saturday (14th) morning! However, they said I would be welcome to stay in their house on my own after they had gone, which was very good of them.

It was apparent there were not enough people to hire a coach and whilst I would have been happy to drive or be driven, I liked the idea of going by train via Eurostar. Online research established the feasibility of doing this, Anne Scicluna preferred to go by train and Vincent Porter decided to join us.

Travelling this way worked very well. All trains were on time and we made all the connections, although some were a bit tight. We caught the train from Chichester, changed at Three Bridges for Thameslink service to St Pancras, then Eurostar to Paris, Gare du Nord, and taxi from there to Gare Montpanasse for the train to Chartres. At Chartres Marc& Marie-France were waiting for me. It was lovely to see Marc looking so well after they had to cancel coming to Chichester with the Exchange back in April due to his health.

On the Friday morning we walked into the centre of Chartres for the 10.00am rendezvous with the rest of the group at the Cathedral. The ancient labyrinth was free of chairs and people were able to 'walk the labyrinth'. For the first time I was able to do so, as did others in the group. Afterwards we had a delightful al fresco lunch before walking home to head off by car for the group visit to the Chateau d'ante.

That evening Marc and Marie-France had invited Philippe and Sylvie Rabartin to dinner, which was a wonderful surprise as I thought they had moved from Chartres entirely, but apparently they still have their house there and now split



their time between Chartres (where Sylvie's mother still lives) and an apartment in St. Jean de Luz near Biaritz. I stayed with Philippe and Sylvie twice in Chartres and they stayed with us once in Chichester and it was great to 'catch up' with them again.

On Saturday evening most of us were planning to see the illuminations in Chartres. We had been advised that you could not book in advance for 'Le Petite Train', that you paid on the train and if you wanted a seat for the 9.00pm train you needed to get in the queue by 8.30pm.

My hosts had departed that morning and I decided to walk into the centre early evening. I bought something to eat and went to the terrace behind the Cathedral to sit and eat whilst admiring the view over the city. At about 8.00pm I noticed 'Le Petite Train' was already there in front of the Cathedral and that some people were already sitting in it. A while later I returned to find the it was already almost full, so I got straight on, rather than wait for any of the others to arrive.



It soon seemed full, but people continued to arrive hoping to get on. Two very large (both tall and wide!) young ladies, identically dressed in black trousers and tops with facial piercings came by looking for somewhere to sit. The driver asked people to squeeze up to let four people sit in each row - it was comfortable for 3, 4 was a squeeze. One of the young ladies found a seat near the front but the other came back towards the rear where I was and said loudly in very good English "Come on guys can someone budge up please? I really want to go on this trip." people kept their eyes down, but my conscience would not let me ignore her, so I got out and offered to let her sit in my row. She squeezed herself on and I got back in, jammed between her and the hard wooden side of the carriage. I saw several others from our group but it was too late for them get a seat. After a while I decided to break the ice and spoke to the young lady. To my surprise she said that, although she lived in Holland, she grew up in London (as did I) and that she and her girlfriend were heading south on holiday. visited Chartres the year before and wanted to stop off again to show her partner.

The illuminations were of course stunning. The discomfort of the boneshaking train was forgotten until we went round a left hand bend and I was squashed even more against the side of the train. After the trip I was able to walk round and see the illuminations at the south and north porches of the Cathedral before returning to the front to see the full 20 minute light and sound show there, which was truly stunning and moving at times It was a fitting end to a very enjoyable visit to Chartres. The following morning I walked to the station to meet up with Anne & Vincent for our reeturn train journey which went well and we were back in Chichester by 6.00pm.

TRIBUTE TO THE MAN WHO SAVED CHARTRES CATHEDRAL



Whilst on the Mini-Exchange to Chartres in September I was taken to a very moving

event in the suburb of Leves. My partner, Dominique, was singing 'The Marseillaise' with her choir at the parade to mark the 75th Anniversary of the Liberation.

The little town was festooned with British, French and American flags and the day was warm and sunny. The streets were closed off so that a convoy of American Military vehicles could be greeted by a group of reenactors dressed in 1940s clothes. A brass band and the choir led a procession with the Maire and the Prefect up to the plaque for Col. Welborn Griffiths, where his great nephew laid some flowers and the last post was played.

Col. Welborn Griffiths (1901 - 1944) was the US Army Officer who saved Chartres Cathedral. The Cathedral was behind enemy lines and it was believed to be occupied by the German Army. An order had been given to shell the Cathedral but Col. Griffiths asked for the order to be delayed while he and one other soldier

searched the Cathedral. When they reported that there were no Germans inside, the

order was rescinded. Later that day (16th August 1944). Col. Griffiths was killed in Leves. The ceremony was attended by Col. Griffith's grandson and great nephew. Also there was Sergeant Schultz, now aged 97, who had served with the Colonel for eighteen months.

The official party laid flowers and the colours were lowered in honour of the fallen and the heroes. The choir, joined by the congregation, then sang the British, American and French National Anthems.

In the crowd I was surrounded by members of the American Friends of Chartres, who come from all over the United States. I also spoke with representatives of the Friends of Leves, which is twinned with Nailsworth which is between Gloucester and Bath.

I was honoured to be part of this very special and unique occasion.

A VERY SPECIAL WEEKEND IN CHARTRES 8th-11th November

Patrick Géroudet made a Presentation to Rob Campling in Chartres' Twinning Office



In the last edition, Rob's article explained that he had been asked by EPA Chartres International to organise a photography exhibition illustrating Chichester to the people of Chartres with the brief that they would like to avoid wellknown portrayals of Chichester beauty spots. He and two other experienced photographers who had exhibited in Chichester Camera Club, Richard Crossley and Richard Ryder, worked on this project throughout the year. Each produced many pictures which they felt had something to say about Chichester and its environment and a number of sessions of positive criticisms of each other's work resulted in a total of twenty one photographs which are now being displayed in Chartres right through to the Spring.

This public exhibition is in the open air along one of Chartres' main avenues, Boulevard Adelphe Chasles, which goes from Place des Épars to Place St Michel and the viewers are able to see these twenty one giant photographs (each one is over a metre square) as they go about their daily life.

Because Rob and Liz had two spare seats available in their car, Ray and I were invited to join them on their trip to Chartres for the opening of this exhibition. They stayed with their 'twins', Jean-Claude and Marie-Claire Grouteau and we were able to stay at Patrick's home in the centre of Chartres - within strolling distance of the exhibition.

Our 'twins', Jean-Michel and Françoise Provôt, were in Erquy and, just before we left Chichester, we received an email from them to let us know that they were leaving Normandy and returning to Chartres so that we would be able to meet with them. They later invited us and Patrick to their home on the Saturday evening. We were delighted as

FRIENDS OF CHARTRES SOIRÉE - NOVEMBER28th







The last event in our festive Christmas soirée was held in the historic Sherbourne Room at the Bishop's Palace and we were delighted to welcome a number of new members and hope to see them at future events. A delicious spread of French cheeses was provided by Anne-Louise Briggs and the newly formed catering team, and was washed down with a glass or two of French wine.

Taking advantage of the comparative quiet while everyone was tucking in, David Nason was prevailed upon to tell us the history of this room and the fine painted panels which form the ceiling. The room itself is named after Bishop Sherbourne, who was responsible for constructing it. The panels were painted by the Bishop's Court Painter, Lambert Barnard. One of the main features of the ceiling are the panels with the Tudor rose and the initials H and K, representing Henry VIII and Katherine of Aragon, painted for an impending visit from the monarch - which never took place. By the time the panels were completed, Katherine had been supplanted by Anne Boleyn. Conveniently, the initials K and H could also represent King Henry.

The Sherbourne Room forms part of the Bishop's Palace for the Diocese of Chichester, and is one of the few episcopal palaces still to be lived in by the Bishop. Elsewhere, Bishops generally live in purpose-built houses with all mod cons. David described his early days in the diocese when Bishop Kemp lived here with his family and large family parties were held here each Christmas. Now it is only used for official and social gatherings. The evening was rounded off with a raffle with a wide variety of gifts donated by members. There were so many that almost everyone left clutching a 'treasure'. **JULIA SANDER**

The Cercle Avancé

For the past twelve years, the Cercle Avancé has met monthly for lively discussion in French in members' homes. The Cercle was the initiative of long-standing Friends of Chartres member, Henrietta Napier, who devised the format for the meetings. We meet from 6.00 - 7.30 pm and a theme for discussion is set in advance. This theme is discussed informally before moving on to more general conversation. A convivial glass of wine and nibbles help the conversation to flow.

Members take turns to host meetings where they provide the refreshments and set the theme for the evening. The only 'rule' is that the theme should have some connection with France, or a French-speaking country. Topics range from the serious such as French politics, history and culture, or the more light-hearted with discussion of favourite French foods or films. Inevitably over the past three years, the discussion has often turned to Brexit and its consequences.

As the Cercle meets in each other's homes, for practical reasons, we have had to restrict numbers in the group to a maximum of 10. We have lost a few long-standing members in recent months, and are looking to build the group up to strength again.

So, if you are interested in keeping up your French by joining in lively discussion, you would be welcome to join us. What level of French is required? You do not need to be at native speaker level, but you do need to be reasonably competent in order to join in the discussion. Not sure? You would be welcome to come to one of our sessions, to see how how you get on.
